



INTRODUCTION

Basketball Australia is committed to a policy of equal opportunity in the programs and services it provides. The aim of the Disability Discrimination Act (DDA) Action Plan is to ensure that necessary steps are taken to promote equitable access to all facets of Basketball Australia as can reasonably be provided. The Action Plan aims to assist in the elimination of discriminatory practices and conditions for people with disabilities by Basketball Australia. The Action Plan is an opportunity to formalise and ensure ongoing development of the current practices to improve the inclusiveness of services provided by Basketball Australia.

Project CONNECT is an excellent opportunity for Basketball Australia, the Australian Sports Commission, the Australian Paralympic Committee and all sporting organisations representing athletes with a disability to work together to provide the best possible opportunities for basketball players with a disability.

PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE

Basketball Australia is a federation of basketball associations from each state and territory in Australia. In 2001, Basketball Australia united Australia's four national bodies (BA, NBL, WNBL & ABA) to form the "One Basketball" concept.

The One Basketball mission statement is,

"To provide all Australians with the opportunity to enjoy basketball in a fun and contemporary environment to the level of their choice and ability."

The One Basketball vision is:

Value for customers through high quality services consistently delivered

Making sure we have a strong and viable community base for the sport, including people infrastructure and resources

Success at the highest levels of international basketball for all of our teams

In the past, Basketball Australia has concentrated on elite level development for people with a disability. Basketball Australia's primary focus was on areas such as:

- Support of the National Teams
- Involvement in the Australian Junior Camp
- Participation in the National Junior Championships Ivor Burge Championship

Project CONNECT now enables Basketball Australia to develop a holistic approach to playing, coaching, officiating and administering the game of basketball at all levels. For many years, Basketball Australia has worked hard to provide basketball players the best possible opportunities to participate in basketball. With the help of Project CONNECT, Basketball Australia hopes to provide these same opportunities to people with a disability.

In order to identify areas that Basketball Australia needed to improve on and areas in which work was already being carried out, State Associations were surveyed by Basketball Australia. Members of Basketball Australia and State Basketball Associations then formed a Reference Group and with consultation with the Australian Sports Commission (ASC), discussed survey results and Project CONNECT strategies in regular teleconferences. The findings from these surveys and the teleconferences constituted the basis of the Disability Action Plan (DAP).

Already, Basketball Australia is involved in programs to help develop opportunities for basketball players with a disability that include:


- Support of the ITCP Coaching network

- Regular communication and assistance to Ausrapid
- · Regular communication and assistance to Special Olympics
- · Local associations provide opportunities for integration of players with a disability to compete
- Opportunities in the Aussie Hoops program
- Support of events such as Gold Cup, State Championships

There are number of critical areas of work, fully documented in Figure 1 of this document, that have been identified by Basketball Australia that will build on its current actions. Broadly, these include:

- Building on the current programs (reviewing, improving and developing) Development of underpinning programs for the National Team Programs Creating participation opportunities for players with a disability
- · Development of the support structures for servicing athletes with disabilities

DISABILITY DISCRIMINATION ACT

The Disability Discrimination Act (1992) makes discrimination on the basis of disability unlawful. It is also unlawful to discriminate against a person on the basis that one of her or his associates has, or may have, a disability. Disability is defined broadly to include:

- · Total or partial loss of the person's bodily or mental functions, or
- · Total or partial loss of a part of the body, or
- The presence in the body of organisms capable of causing disease or illness, or
- The malfunction, malformation or disfigurement of a part of the person's body, or
- · A disorder or malfunction that results in a person learning differently from a person without the disorder or malfunction, or
- A disorder, illness or disease that affects a person's thought processes, perception or reality, emotions or judgement or that
 results in disturbed behaviour.

It covers disability that presently exists, previously existed but no longer exists, may exist in the future or is imparted to a person even if the person does not have a disability. The Act is about promoting a culture and environment where discrimination against people because of a disability is unacceptable and inappropriate. It discourages and prohibits types of behaviour that discriminates against people with a disability and attempts to provide for an equitable environment. There are specific provisions in the Act relevant to sport. A person with a disability must not be excluded from taking part in basketball if he or she is:

- · Capable of playing the sport, or
- Selected to play the sport on the basis of his or her skills and abilities.

A person with a disability should also not be excluded from any administrative or coaching activities associated with the sport. For example, if a person with a disability has the necessary skills to compete in basketball competitively, he or she cannot be excluded because of asthma or a hearing loss. In addition, under the Act a person with a disability has a right to be a member of a club or association in the same way as a person without a disability. It is against the law for clubs and associations to discriminate against a person because of his or her disability. This means clubs and associations cannot:

- Refuse to accept an application for membership from a person with a disability,
- Provide membership on less favourable terms and conditions. For example, a club may want to offer a person with a disability part membership or charge that person more for membership,
- Limit a person's access to the benefits and activities offered by the club or association because that person has a disability. For example, restricting the activities a person with a disability can take part in or the hours he or she can use the club.

Section 28(3) contains a number of exemptions. Broadly speaking, discrimination against a person with a disability in a sporting activity is not unlawful if:

- The person is not reasonably capable of performing the actions reasonably required in relation to the sporting activity, or
- A sporting team is chosen by a selection process that is reasonable on the basis of the skills and abilities relevant to the sporting activity and relative to each other, or
- A sporting activity is conducted only for persons with a particular type of disability and the person does not have that disability.

Discouraging and prohibiting types of behaviour that causes discrimination is largely a question of awareness, education and training. This is the focus of the Project CONNECT Disability Action Plan. Unlawful discrimination within sport can be either direct or indirect. Both forms can be avoided through the provision of education and training programs that give providers a framework and clear strategies to address discrimination issues. Direct discrimination occurs when a person is treated less favourably because the person has a disability. Less favourable treatment means that

the person is disadvantaged and doesn't have the same opportunities or choices as a person without a disability. Indirect discrimination occurs where a 'condition' stops a person with a disability from doing something. A condition can include physical barriers, policies, practices, selection or admission criteria, rules or requirements. This Action Plan is a further step to ensure that direct or indirect discrimination does not occur.



RATIONALE

Inclusion is a process of adaptation, in which programs and procedures are modified to better serve the learning and participation requirements of participants with disabilities. It enables coaches, officials and administrators of Basketball Australia and its affiliated associations to welcome new players of all abilities and ensures that every athlete is challenged to learn and enjoy basketball.

Learning, socialisation, independence and safety are assured for the participant when all coaches, officials and administrators are aware of their role in the inclusion process.

Our commitment is to progress through the Action Plan and ensure that Basketball Australia and it's affiliated associations over time will have information provided that is culturally appropriate and user friendly to all patrons. We also aim to enhance the opportunities for participation and to ensure the availability of trained staff to assist people with special needs.

This Plan will consider all people with disabilities including:

- People who are blind or have a vision impairment
- People with physical disabilities
- People with intellectual disabilities
- People with hearing impairments
- People with communication disabilities

AIMS

It is our aim, through the implementation, evaluation and review of the Basketball Australia Disability Action Plan, to:

- Reflect and promote the objectives of the Disability Discrimination Act (1992) and to provide people with disabilities equal
 access to services and facilities.
- Provide opportunities for people with disabilities to be involved and participate in basketball. Promote and market basketball as an accessible sport for people with a disability.
- Make available to people with disabilities a variety of options, similar to those offered to participants without disabilities, from recreational to competitive, from local to elite international standards.
- Improve participation, preparation and quality of coaching, officiating and administration of basketball competitions for athletes with a disability.
- Develop a network and structure, which will provide people with disabilities a sound direction to participate, compete and achieve
- Promote Basketball Australia in order to increase the profile and community awareness. Increase the number of participants in basketball.
- · Encourage generic clubs and associations to undertake or to be involved in programs for people with disabilities.
- Ensure participants with disabilities are seen as participants to reinforce their ability and skill level rather than their disability.
- Encourage the involvement of people with a disability in decision making processes regarding service delivery for people with a disability
- Accomplishments and positive attitudes developed on the playing field can have a positive impact on the quality of daily living for all participants.

REVIEW OF POLICIES AND PROGRAMS TO ACHIEVE THE OBJECTIVES OF SECTION 61 OF THE DISABILITY DISCRIMINATION ACT (DDA)

Basketball Australia is committed to a policy of equal opportunity in the services it provides. Basketball Australia will develop a formal disability policy for equal opportunity in the services they provide, thereby demonstrating their ongoing commitment towards eliminating discrimination. A policy entitled "Equal Opportunity for Participants with a Disability" would include statements that seek to abolish discrimination within Basketball Australia.

Basketball Australia is committed to:

- Ensuring that participants with disabilities are accorded complete and equitable access to opportunities provided by Basketball Australia as circumstances would reasonably allow.
- Accepting that it has a legal and moral responsibility to eliminate from its structures and practices any source of direct or indirect discrimination affecting participants with permanent or temporary disabilities.
- Working to achieve inclusive practices that meet the needs of all participants, including those with disabilities.
- Developing and implementing a Disability Action plan to ensure that it provides a physical and social environment in which
 participants with disabilities have access to all services provided by Basketball Australia. Key issues in achieving this vision
 through the Action Plan are detailed in the following section.
- The strategic plan of Basketball Australia should reflect this strong commitment to eliminating discrimination.
- This policy should be widely promoted and circulated to all clubs, members, coaches, officials and administrators of Basketball Australia.

KEY ISSUES AND STRATEGIES

Key Issue 1: Policy

"That Basketball Australia policy ensures accessibility to basketball competition and training programs throughout Australia"

Strategy: To ensure that inclusion of people with a disability becomes intrinsically a part of Basketball Australia's strategies

Key Issue 2: Awareness and Education

"That Basketball Australia (affiliated associations, referees, coaches and administrators) deliver quality services to basketball participants with a disability"

Strategy: Educate and prepare affiliated associations, clubs and service providers to include basketball participants with a disability in all levels of service delivery.

Key areas to be addressed are:

- 1. Associations and Administrators
- 2. Coaches
- 3. Officials

Key Issue 3: Development, Participation and Competition

"Basketball Australia will provide the opportunity for people with a disability to participate in basketball at all levels"

Strategy: Increase participation rates in basketball for athletes with a disability in all levels of service. Key areas to be addressed are:

- 1. Developmental
- 2. Competition (local, regional)
- 3. Competition (state, national)
